Opinion

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS As of and for the Year Ended December 31, 2023

1. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

Point Wilhite Water System, Inc. (the "water system"), is a nonprofit organization domiciled in Downsville, Louisiana, and organized under the provisions of Louisiana Revised Statutes 12:201-269. The water system is governed by a five member board of directors who are members of the water system and who are elected by members of the water system. The water system provides water to members residing within the territorial boundaries of the water system. The water system has approximately 850 active members and no employees.

B. INVESTMENTS

At December 31, 2023, the water system's investments consist of a nonnegotiable certificate of deposit with an original maturity that exceeds 90 days that is reported in the accompanying financial statements at cost.

C. RECEIVABLES

Accounts receivable consist of amounts due from members for water service provided prior to year end. Receivables are reported at the net amount expected to be collected by using an allowance for credit losses. On January 1, 2023, the water system adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2016-13 Financial Instruments - Credit Losses: Measurement of Credit Losses on Financial Instruments (ASC 326). This standard changed the water system's method of recognizing bad debt expense from the incurred loss method to the current expected loss method. ASC 326 requires that the estimate of credit losses on trade receivables be based not only on historical experience but also on current conditions and reasonable forecasts of future events. In accordance with ASC 326, the water system's estimate of the allowance for credit losses is based on the accounts included in receivables at year end that have been disconnected for nonpayment. Nonpayment of customer accounts within ten days from the due date are subject to a 10% late penalty. Accounts not paid within ninety days from the due date are disconnected. Past due accounts are written off when they are considered uncollectible by management.

D. PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Major improvements to the water system, construction in progress, buildings, and equipment purchases with a cost of \$1,000 or more are capitalized by the water system. Property, plant, and equipment is recorded at actual cost. Depreciation of all exhaustible property, plant, and equipment is charged as an expense against operations. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over estimated useful lives of 25 to 50 years for the water production and distribution system and 5 years for buildings. Depreciation expense for the year ended December 31, 2023 was \$105,858.

E. FEDERAL GRANT FUNDS

The accounting and reporting of grants is determined by the underlying substance of the transaction. A grant may be accounted for as contribution, an exchange transaction, or a combination of the two. If it is determined to be a contribution, a grant may be considered a conditional or an unconditional grant.

The water system has adopted FASB ASU 2018-08, Clarifying the Scope and the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made. The ASU provides clarified guidance on evaluating whether grant funds should be accounted for as a contribution or an exchange transaction based on whether the grantor is receiving value in return for the resources transferred to the grantee. Grant funds are considered contributions if the grantor does not receive commensurate value in exchange for the assets transferred. ASU 2018-08 also provides guidance to determine whether grants funds that are accounted for as contributions are considered conditional or unconditional. Grant funds are considered conditional if the grantee must overcome one or more barriers before it is entitled to the funds and a right of return to the grantor exists for funds transferred. For conditional grants, revenue is recognized in the period the condition or conditions are met. For grants that are considered unconditional, revenue is recognized in the period the grant funds are received.

For the year ended December 31, 2023, the water system received American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 ("ARPA") funding through the Union Parish Police Jury (the "Police Jury"). The Police Jury agreed to provide \$343,007 for the water system's meter project. The ARPA funding is accounted for as a contribution and is considered conditional because the funds must be used solely for the purpose specified in the water system's application for funding and are disbursed to the water system as project costs are incurred.

F. INCOME TAX STATUS

The water system is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501 c (12) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The water system's Forms 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax, for the years ended 2020, 2021, and 2022 are subject to examination by the IRS, generally for three years after they were filed.

G. ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

H. INTEREST COSTS

I. FUNCTIONAL ALLOCATION OF EXPENSES

The water system's only activity is to provide water service to its members. All costs incurred by the water system are incurred for the purpose of providing water service; therefore, it is not feasible to allocate expenses between program services and support services.

At December 31, 2023, the water system has \$903,836 in deposits (collected bank balances). These deposits are secured from risk by \$250,000 federal deposit insurance and \$370,222 in pledged securities held by an unaffiliated bank in the name of the water system. The remaining balance of \$283,614 is unsecured at December 31, 2023.

For the year ended December 31, 2023, the total amount billed for water services was \$506,909. The average monthly billing per customer was \$45.30. The water system had 850 active customers at December 31, 2023. Residential customers are billed \$27.25 (plus \$1 safe drinking water fee) for the first 2,000 gallons of water used plus \$9 per thousand gallons for consumption over 2,000 gallons. Commercial customers are billed \$55 for the first 2,000 gallons of water used plus \$9 per thousand gallons for consumption over 2,000 gallons. New customers are charged a \$150 refundable meter deposit fee and a \$1,000 meter installation fee. Customers are charged a \$25 reconnect fee when service is disconnected for nonpayment.

4. REVENUE FROM CONTRACTS WITH CUSTOMERS

The water system adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board's ("FASB") Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") 2014-09 Revenue from Contracts with Customers and all subsequent amendments to the ASU (collectively Accounting Standards Codification ("ASC") 606) which creates a single framework for recognizing revenue from contracts with customers that fall within its scope. The

water system's revenue from contracts with customers within the scope of ASC 606 is reported as water sales and meter installations on the Statement of Activities. Water sales are recognized in the period the gallons of water are produced and delivered to the customer. The customer is billed monthly for the number of gallons of water delivered during the previous month and payment is due by the 10th of the following month. The receivable for water sales at the beginning and the end of the year was \$93,474 and \$72,855, respectively. Meter installation fees are recognized when the customer signs the water users agreement and pays the fee.

Construction in progress at December 31, 2023, consists of the cost of meters that were purchased during 2023 as part of the water system's new meter project.

7. LOANS PAYABLE

At December 31, 2023, there is a total of \$1,256,627, remaining on the principal balances of three loans. The original amounts of the loans totaled \$2,794,200. One of the loans was obtained from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) - Rural Development and two were obtained from the Louisiana Department of Health (LDH) Drinking Water Revolving Loan Fund. The loans are secured by mortgages of certain properties owned by the water system that are described within the related instruments of mortgage and the pledge of revenue. Proceeds from the loans were used to fund a portion of the cost of the construction and acquisition of the water system's property, plant, and equipment.

8. CONCENTRATION OF INDEBTEDNESS

As discussed in Note 7 above, 92% of the water system's debt is with the Louisiana Department of Health. The water system's facilities and all of its revenue are pledged as collateral for this debt.

9. ASSETS WITH CONTRACTUAL RESTRICTIONS/ BOARD DESIGNATIONS

The loan agreement with the United States Department of Agriculture - Rural Development for the loans discussed in Note 7 above, requires the water system to set aside an amount equal to the annual installment of principal and interest due on all outstanding loans. At December 31, 2023, the water system was required to have \$16,428 set aside in reserve accounts. The water system had \$42,969 in reserve fund certificates of deposit at December 31, 2023.

The water system has designated \$73,050 of the amount in its Operating and Maintenance bank account as funds set aside for the refunding of customer meter deposits. The customer meter deposit liability at December 31, 2023, was \$73,700.

The loan agreements with the Louisiana Department of Health (LDH) discussed in Note 7 above, require the water system to establish and maintain the following accounts:

2008 Debt Service Fund - monthly payments equal to 1/6th of the interest and administrative fee due on the next interest payment date and 1/12th of the principal due on any principal payment date that occurs within the next ensuing twelve months. Funds are to be used to pay principal, interest and administrative fees falling due.

2008 Debt Service Reserve Fund - monthly or annual payments until a maximum of \$34,000 has been accumulated within a period not to exceed five years from the date of the loan. Funds are to be used to pay principal and interest on loan as to which there would otherwise be default.

2015 Debt Service Fund - monthly payments equal to 1/6th of the interest and administrative fee due on the next interest payment date and 1/12th of the principal due on any principal payment date that occurs within the next ensuing twelve months. Funds are to be used to pay principal, interest and administrative fees falling due.

2015 Debt Service Reserve Fund - monthly or annual payments until a maximum of \$39,500 has been accumulated within a period not to exceed five years from the date of the loan. Funds are to be used to pay principal and interest on loan as to which there would otherwise be default.

Contingencies Fund - monthly payments equal to 5% of the gross revenues of the preceding month after making payments required by the accounts described above. Such payments are to continue until a maximum of \$75,000 has been accumulated. Funds are to be used for extensions, additions, improvements, renewals, and replacements necessary to properly operate the water system and may also be used to pay principal and interest on the loan when there is not sufficient funds in the debt service and debt service reserve funds; however, the amount in the fund may not be less than \$7,500.

10. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTION

During 2023, the water system contracted for maintenance services with the brother in law of a former board member who is now a secretary for the water system. For the year ended December 31, 2023, the water system paid this individual \$97,378. The amount due this individual at December 31, 2023 was \$7,975.

11. CONTINGENCIES

On December 21, 2020, the Louisiana Department of Health (LDH) issued an administrative order citing the water system with certain violations of state drinking water regulations during the period January 1, 2018 through December 31, 2019, and ordered the water system to take certain remedial actions to comply with all applicable state rules, regulations, and standards. State law provides that if the water system fails to comply with any provision of the administrative order, LDH may assess a penalty up to a maximum of \$650 per day, for each day the water system is not in compliance. Additionally, if LDH finds it necessary to refer the matter for civil action, the court may impose a civil penalty not to exceed \$3,000 per day for each day of violation and for each act of violation. The water system has taken steps to remedy the violations, but as of December 31, 2023, LDH has not officially cleared the administrative order.

During the year ended December 31, 2023, the water system expended \$191,514 in ARPA grant funds passed through the Union Parish Police Jury (the "Police Jury"). The Police Jury agreed to provide \$343,007 for the water system's meter project. These expenses are subject to audit and adjustment by grantor agencies; therefore, to the extent that the water system has not complied with the rules and regulations governing the grant funds, refunds of any money received may be required. In the opinion of the water system's management, there are no significant contingent liabilities relating to compliance with the rules and regulations governing the grant funds; therefore, no provision has been recorded in the accompanying financial statements for such contingencies.

12. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The water system has evaluated subsequent events through July 8, 2024, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.
